

Butterfly Facts

- Did you know that there are over 250 species of butterflies in the Sonoran Desert? A varied topography means a corresponding variety of microclimates, rainfall patterns, plant distributions, and therefore butterfly distributions.
- Butterfly lives have four distinct stages: egg, caterpillar (or larva), chrysalis (or pupa), and adult.
- Butterflies produce one or more generations (broods) per year. The length of the complete life cycle varies greatly, ranging from weeks to a couple of years or more in desert adapted species.

About our Speaker:

Elizabeth Willott is curator for Butterfly Magic. She came to the Gardens July 2009 from the University of Arizona where she was doing research on the tobacco hornworm, Manduca sexta, and mosquitoes, as well as teaching biology and environmental ethics. She has coedited a book: "Environmental Ethics: what really matters, what really works" (Oxford, 2002; 2nd edition out soon) and has published on a variety of topics related to ethics and ecology. She continues to do mosquito surveillance and research through a National Science Foundation grant to several investigators in Geography at the University of Arizona.

Aquatic Plant Profile

Azolla (Azolla caroliniana)

We had an entire kiddy pool brimming with this fascinating tiny floating aquatic fern at our May sale. *Azolla* is also know as mosquito fern, duckweed fern, fairy moss, or

as mosquito fern, duckweed fern, fairy moss, or water fern. Azolla is able to multiply its weight extremely rapidly during the summer months, creating a virtual carpet among the other water plants. It can become pink, red, or dark brown as the plant matures, and, when exposed to strong sunlight. Its tiny leaves resemble a cedar leaf, and can also be a supplemental source of food for koi and goldfish. Don't be afraid that it will take over your water garden...there's always the compost pile if your azolla "carpet" gets too big, too thick, or, just too much!
